

IMPORTANT INSTRUCTIONAL WORDS

When asked to answer assignment or test questions, it makes a lot of sense to know exactly what you are being asked to do. The following lists of questioning words and their meanings are consistent with those used on external assessment tasks and exams. The earlier you learn about, understand and use them, the better you will perform with confidence in tests.
